IRCOM Highlights

IRCOM's unique **settlement model** – housing plus onsite programming – provided a safe and affordable home to **471 newcomer parents, youth, and children**. This year, we welcomed **42 new families,** totalling 152 people.

Our Newcomer Youth Participatory Action program organized a **youth-led** community forum called **Empowering Youth for Change** to cap off their two-year Participatory Action Research project! Youth shared their research and advocacy work and led a panel discussion with their peers and system stakeholders on anti-racism in education. The project consulted **250 youth** and **stakeholders** throughout the project! These youth exemplified outstanding leadership, passion, and dedication to community throughout this project.

The **Refugee Integration Support and Employability** (RISE) pre-employability program moved beyond the pilot phase, as the program ran for its **second year**. This year, **63 participants** successfully completed the RISE program! Participants learned about working and finding jobs in Canadian contexts, resume writing, practiced mock interviews, and learned job-specific English and computer skills. While not a focus of the program, **six** participants even **found jobs** through RISE supports!

IRCOM was featured in the **My Future Home Global Report**. We are proud to be part of Canada's network of housing advocates and policy changes as we work together towards **just and equitable solutions** to our housing needs.

IRCOM acknowledges that the land we are on is Treaty 1 Territory, the traditional territories of the Anishinabeg, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota, and Dene Peoples, and the homeland of the Métis Nation. The water that IRCOM uses comes from Shoal Lake First Nation #40, an Ojibwa community that is part of Treaty 3. The electricity that IRCOM uses comes from Treaty 5, the homeland of the Ojibwa and Swampy Cree Peoples. IRCOM affirms that we are all treaty people and that we are committed to truth and reconciliation.

Every day at IRCOM is marked by quiet celebrations.

Our tenant families come here after a long and difficult journey. Yet, if you walk through our halls, you see smiles — dads holding babies waiting for daycare to open, or moms walking their kids to school, sharing a greeting as they negotiate strollers through the snow. We see strength, determination, and enormous courage as our families tackle this new life. It makes the long hours and hard work worth it.

We are proud that Canada remains a place that welcomes refugees. The other day, I met a father and son who walked the length of this continent to make it to our doorstep. Today, I spoke with a tenant who was soon moving out from IRCOM. He said that IRCOM was 'so good to us.' With supports for his whole family, and because his rent never exceeded \$500 a month, he could manage the costs of accreditation and training, and he was able to study and work non-stop for three years. Now he has a great job in banking. He said he could never have achieved this without IRCOM!

Last year, IRCOM served 1055 people from over 20 different countries. As you read through our Annual Report, you will see newcomers of all ages enjoying nine distinct programs, learning new skills, gaining knowledge, building connections, and becoming Canadians.

This year, IRCOM was recognized in many ways. We collaborated locally with an international effort to bring vulnerable women and girls in extremely dangerous conditions to Canada for safety and healing. In our meetings with local politicians, we have seen strong support for both immigration and for increasing the stock of deeply affordable housing. We co-presented with housing providers from across Canada at national conferences, and we were thrilled to host a visit from the UNHCR (UN Refugee Agency) Canada!

None of this would be possible without the generous support of our partners, donors, funders, and volunteers! Thank you to board and committee members who make us stronger. Finally, a huge thank you to the staff team. You make every day a great day at IRCOM. Thank you all for helping so many newcomers find a community of belonging.

Our Journey with IRCOM

The **After School Program** is my favourite place to be! My little sister goes to Children's program. She makes arts and crafts, tries new sports, and reads in English. My brother and I go to Homework program every week. School was hard at first because I was not used to Canadian schools but going to Homework program helps me feel like I can belong here. My brother plays on the boys' soccer team. I'm going to try out for the girls' team this year. In the summer, there are programs every day. We volunteer in the community, we barbeque and play games, visit museums and parks, and learn about the land from Indigenous teachers. My siblings and I made a lot of friends here!

The **Facilities and Tenancies** staff made us feel so welcome. They helped up us understand our lease, and the suite is safe and clean. The rent is affordable, so we can save money to pay for our kids' activities and for me to go back to school. I start school to be a healthcare aide this fall! If we need something fixed in our apartment, the Facilities staff can help. My husband even found a job as a painter by volunteering with Facilities. We love living at IRCOM and will be sad to leave, but now we have confidence that our family can find a good home here.

The Community Resource Program

Settlement and integration

staff and an interpreter met with us in

our home as soon as we moved in. They helped us make a settlement plan by identifying our immediate needs – all in our language! The life-skills worker taught us how to catch the bus to get groceries and go to school. Our social worker is helping us access supports for our youngest son who needs a hearing aid. I go to Women's program each week to visit my neighbours and learn about so many things, like going to the doctor, staying active, and getting involved in my community. I'm excited to join the parenting program and cooking program soon. They even have child care during programs!

Wraparound holistic services

The Greening Program

is a chance for my family and our neighbours to grow food together. Each family has their garden plot. We can grow vegetables from back home and try new ones. My children love to help. It makes my heart full to use my skills from back home, here, and pass them down to my children. The gardens make our community so beautiful and we get to enjoy fresh, healthy food!

Asset and Capacity Building Programs

taught us a lot about money in Canada. We learned about credit, interest, and savings. The staff taught us about RESPs and helped us open accounts for our kids' future. I joined a matched savings program to help pay for dental work and save for a college course. A staff member who speaks my language helped me understand taxes and even helped me file them.



The Volunteer & Community

Services Program helped me get Canadian work experience. I started volunteering with the Child Care program. I learned a lot. When my English improved, I was able to get a job outside of IRCOM because of my child care experience. Now that I am working, I come back to volunteer with the After School Program.

are safe spaces our children. I started English classes with IRCOM because my two-year-old daughter can attend child care while I learn. She is thriving in child care. Many of the staff speak our language but she is learning English so fast. They play games, sing songs, and do lots of crafts. My neighbour is a single mom and she just started a new job. The ECD Hub downstairs is a licensed daycare where she can drop off her child.

The Newcomer Literacy Initiative

helps me learn English with other newcomers. I go to half-day classes at IRCOM while my youngest is in child care. My teacher makes it fun, and we use lots of games to help us remember. I am getting more comfortable speaking English. It's still scary but I now can ask people for help and make my own doctor appointments on the phone!

Common Ground, Stronger Voices

I did not know a lot about Canada before I came here. Common Ground came to my English class, and we learned about different Indigenous cultures. Then I signed up for land-based field trips where we learned about sage, traditional medicine, and made tobacco ties. But my favourite activity was going to the big powwow. The regalia and dancing were amazing! It reminded me of my culture back home. We are all unique but similar!

Newcomer Youth Participatory Action Research Project

My friend was part of this new program last year and he told me I should join. We learn about human rights and social justice. We get to be researchers in our own community to learn about the challenges and barriers our peers face. We also talk about solutions and how to advocate for change! This program has inspired me to go to university to study research and social sciences.

Facilities and Tenancy Services

Housing is a fundamental human right – it is the foundation that allows people to live with dignity. According to the Canadian Mortgage Housing Corporation, in 2023 **social housing** represented only **3.5 percent** of Canada's total housing stock. Low-income families continue to feel the acute effects, like food insecurity and precarious or inadequate housing, that rising costs and housing shortages bring.

Safe and affordable housing creates stability for all other settlement processes to begin. When families move beyond survival mode and precarity, they can focus on learning the language, accessing health and school systems, finding work, and **pursuing their goals**.

Last year, we saw not only a higher volume of applicants but also an increase in highly vulnerable refugee families, facing complex barriers. **IRCOM offers 110 families their first home in Canada** along with the support they need in their first three years, to be able to integrate into Canadian society and thrive. **This year, we welcomed 42 new families to their new home**.

Our Facilities team strengthened **safety and sustainability** in our buildings with LED lighting upgrades throughout Isabel common areas and courtyard improvements, while Ellen received a new key card access system and accessibility enhancements. **Our buildings are brighter and more accessible**!

ASP holistically supports children and youth's intersectional needs as they navigate settlement, integration, and belonging. Our strengths-based programs empower children through literacy, arts, and social-recreational opportunities, and youth through leadership and capacity building, pre-employability training, peer support and sharing circles, academic enrichment, and cross-cultural learning.

After one year in our **permanent space at IRCOM's Learning Centre**, our Homework and Education for Youth (HEY) program experienced high attendance and youth engagement. We have seen **youth improve and thrive in school, build positive peer relationships, explore their creative and academic interests, and build interest in post-secondary education.**

The HEY classroom **added new learning aids**, including additional computers so that more youth can now work on homework, access online learning tools, and develop computer skills. A daily sharing circle was introduced, where staff and youth discuss cultural and current events and explore emerging topics such as the influence of AI in education.

Our Cobras soccer teams in the Winnipeg Youth Soccer Association continue to make us proud! The U17 Boys placed second in the league finals. The U16 Girls played a great season, experienced some amazing wins, and saw strong development as a team.

Our **Children's Program** went through transition as we reintroduced a cooking program, where children learned about nutrition and made kid-friendly recipes, and we said goodbye to our Mini Girls Sports pilot program.

I was shy and didn't know anyone at first. I started Book Club to help with my English and ended up making friends and joining other programs like soccer and Leadership. The staff really listen to us and do everything they can to help us do well."

Newcomer Literacy Initiative

One of the **first steps to integrate into Canadian society is learning English**. Our adult students learn topics that are relevant to their daily lives so that they gain the confidence to do daily tasks like buying groceries, going to the bank, or communicating with their children's teachers. For adult students, learning to do everyday activities and making friends in a new language can be daunting and isolating. IRCOM's NLI program offers a welcoming space to build connections in the community and begin to feel at home.

This year, our **highly accessible** half-day classes with onsite child care, enrolled over **60 adult students**. Students and teachers celebrated many stories of students using English outside the classroom. One student shared that they are **learning English together as a family**. At home, they practice reading to their children in English, and they sing the songs that their child learns while in child care! Another shared how they practiced calling a repairman in class, which gave them courage to call a plumber to fix their sink!

NLI continued to integrate opportunities for **truth and reconciliation** into the classroom. IRCOM's Common Ground, Stronger Voices program visited classes to share Indigenous culture, and students participated in a workshop on powwow protocols — this workshop prepared students to attend the Manito Ahbee Pow Wow.

Our Child Care Program helps tenants with young children access IRCOM programs. Without child care, many parents would not be able to attend settlement and orientation workshops, employability programming, English classes, or parenting and peer support programs.

In program, children play learning games and **acquire important skills** like emotional regulation and positive social interaction. Our diverse team speaks 19 languages combined, most of which are represented within our tenant population – the ability to communicate in families' first language builds trust among parents and staff as they begin bringing their children to program.

We support parents to learn about their children's developmental milestones and how to **encourage positive progress at home**. Every program, children explore and play with arts and craft, music, and practice motor skills. The Child Care program empowers children to grow into their own potential and sets them up for success when they are old enough to attend school. We are always amazed to see how children thrive in inclusive and safe spaces!

This year, a **total of 32 children between 6 months and 6 years** attended child care 4 days a week for our 10 months of English classes, totalling an astounding **1,390 hours of childcare**. We also provided 390 hours of child care for 161 workshops/programs across the organization, benefiting **227 newcomer children**.

Asset and Capacity Building Programs

Our **Asset and Capacity Building Program** empowers newcomer families with specialized financial education to increase financial literacy in Canadian contexts. Partnerships with SEED and United Way Winnipeg allow us to provide **money management education**, **matched savings programs** – including a dedicated program to repay government immigration loans – **access to benefits**, and a **community financial helpline**. IRCOM's financial literacy programs are available to our tenants as well as the broader newcomer community.

The economic reality for many people is increasingly challenging with increased costs to living. Our **holistic approach** alleviates poverty by **leveraging money back to the community** and supporting families to talk about and **implement healthy money habits** that set them up for success both now and looking into the future.

In our matched savings programs, families saved for needed assets like dental care, school tuition, textbooks, computers, and more. Clients received help obtaining identification, filing taxes, and opening RESP accounts. Our Access to Benefits team hosted a special workshop on financial scam awareness and prevention, after identifying a need in our community.

At the beginning, I learned a lot of things that seemed difficult for a newcomer. When I [learned more], they become easier, such as how to keep track of my monthly expenses... and the differences between financial institutions. I will be more careful to save money."

Early Childhood Development Hub

The Early Childhood Development (ECD) Hub, in partnership with Freight House Early Learning & Care, provides quality, licensed childcare inspired by Abecedarian approach, an evidenced-based model that improves socio-emotional learning outcomes for vulnerable children. This holistic approach to daycare meets the needs of the youngest members of our community and increases school readiness by fostering learning, development, and socialization in a safe, culturally diverse environment.

Our ECD Hub Coordinator helps families without daycare **access respite spots**, enabling them to attend refugee claimant hearings, doctor appointments, or attend to other immediate needs. Daycare is a huge need for our families! It can be a barrier, especially for mothers, to access education, work, or to pursue other settlement goals.

In addition to the daycare component, our ECD Hub Coordinator provides early **child development education** through home visits, one-on-one drop-ins, and **parenting programs**. Parents come to Canada with many skills but settlement stressors, parenting contexts, and environments may be different. IRCOM's ECD Hub works with parents **to honour their cultural values** and learn about parenting in a new country. In parenting programs, parents can learn from each other, support each other, and build relationships with their neighbours. Daycare helped me to access work. I like the daycare it is helping my son to learn, now he knows the alphabet, colors, count numbers and speaks English. His social skills have been improved. He learned painting and coloring. We like the daycare because it helps [us] to work and helped the children to learn more things."

Community Resource Program

The **Community Resource Program** encourages community among our tenants and equips them with information, resources, and **opportunity to use their strengths and pursue their settlement goals**. We provide case management and Canadian life skills coaching to families facing barriers to settlement with home visits **in first language**, accessible drop-ins, and group programming with interpretation and childcare.

This year, we had **1955 home visits and 3811 drop-ins**! Our group programs covered topics such as healthy relationships, reproductive health, dental hygiene, mental wellness, family law, and more.

We were thrilled to add **Inclusion Support Workers** to our team this year, who provided children and youth with disabilities additional supports to **meaningfully participate** in programs. These staff also brought English learning to adults unable to attend English classes.

As always, our work is improved by the considerable **skills and contributions** of our tenants. They not only rebuild social networks with neighbours of diverse backgrounds and languages, but they also contribute their **time and talents** to make our IRCOM community a safe and welcoming place. Tenants organized our Neighborhood Watch and initiated road safety awareness among children and youth, and our **Tenant Leaders** shared valuable feedback with staff and facilitated strong and trusting relationships within our shared community.

Common Ground, Stronger Voices

The **Common Ground, Stronger Voices** project **integrates Indigenous histories, knowledge, and cultures** into IRCOM programs. Special work shops and events create grassroot opportunities for Indigenous-newcomer communities to **build bridges and foster lasting connections**. IRCOM is committed to **taking actionable steps** and demonstrating reciprocity towards **truth and reconciliation**. We are grateful for the generosity of Indigenous organizations and leaders who walk beside us in this journey.

Partners such as Rossbrook House, FortWhyte Alive, Mount Carmel Clinic, and the North End Women's Centre supported **land-based learning** and joint programming for tenants and community members, including sage picking, a moccasin making workshop, family cooking classes, and a visit to Bois-des-Esprits.

sākihiwē festival partnered with us again to host a **community concert** with performers from both newcomer and Indigenous backgrounds, including Hoop dancer Shanley Spence, Double the Trouble, and Winnipeg Dance Collective.

Cultural Advisor, John Houle, enriched our events and programs with meaning and ceremony. Knowledge Keeper, **Clayton Sandy**, strengthened our program by connecting our communities, including hosting a mini powwow where tenants learned about grass, fancy, traditional, and hoop dance, and the cultural significance of dancers' regalia. This new event acted as a primer for tenants to attend the **Manito Ahbee Pow Wow, the second largest powwow in Canada**.

IRCOM Ellen's shared balconies turn into container garden plots every summer. Tenants use their agricultural skills, or learn new skills, and **grow healthy, affordable food for their families**. Many involve their children so that they can learn where their food comes from and how to grow it.

The simple act of gardening offers profound opportunities for families to root their cultural foods and knowledge here on Canadian soil, while learning new foods, techniques, and growing climates. The gardens **beautify our community** and promote **wellness** while offsetting the rising cost of groceries. We estimated an average of **\$80 in savings per month** when tenants can supplement their groceries with produce that they harvest.

This past year, we had **13 growers** - 10 were new to the program and brand new to Canada. They were happy to grow organic, healthy food. At the end of the season, we opened the program up to the rest of the Ellen tenants and partnered with the Immigrant Centre to provide a **workshop on nutrition**.

We are planning to expand our gardens and offer more tenants the chance to grow container gardens on their own balconies. We are fortunate to benefit from the incredible skills of our talented Greening Coordinator, as he coaches tenants in growing beautiful gardens.



Solunteer and Community Services Program

The Volunteer Program **connects Canadians with the newcomer communit**y through volunteer opportunities in all IRCOM programs and provides newcomers a unique chance to engage in their new environment and **build valuable Canadian work experience**. IRCOM could not provide our diverse suite of programs without the dedication of our volunteers.

This year, our **150 volunteers contributed close to 13,000 hours**, with the most hours in our Newcomer Literacy Initiative and Homework and Education for Youth programs. **Thirty-eight tenant volunteers** also volunteered their time and skills as Neighborhood Watch and Tenant Leaders, making our neighborhood safer for our children and building strong and trusting relationships with all our tenants.

Twenty-five participants from IRCOM's employability program, RISE, gained exposure to the Canadian workplace through volunteering with our Child Care and Facilities teams. We also welcomed **20 practicum students** throughout the organization.

Volunteers generously share their skills and time. They enrich our programs with one-on-one tutoring, conversational English practice, mentor and our children and youth, and so much more! They lighten the load of our program facilitators and help create a **community of belonging** for all. Thank you to each and every volunteer for sharing their gifts and being part of our community!

I [volunteer] at IRCOM because I always like working with newcomers coming from so many different countries and cultures. I was an adult EAL teacher for years after retiring from K-12 and missed the adults a lot. I've been so happy in Carlos' classroom every week as there's such a great atmosphere, camaraderie and learning going on. Thanks so much for the opportunity!"

Research and Evaluation at IRCOM

The Newcomer Youth Participatory Action Research team (NYPAR) concluded its two-year youth-led research and advocacy project that focused on newcomer refugee youth and issues faced by them in the education and justice systems. The project was based on an innovative approach to positive youth and community development in which youth are trained to conduct systematic research to improve their lives, communities, and the institutions intended to serve them.

Youth researchers, guided by Drs. Aynslie Hinds and Sarah Zell, learned about different research methods, particularly survey development, question formulation, and **photovoice** techniques. Youth developed and conducted surveys and interviews and participated in workshops on data analysis. Youth then took findings from their research to **advocate for themselves and their communities**.

The project culminated with a series of workshops with **Just TV** where youth expressed themselves through multimedia in a safe, fun, and creative environment. The result was a powerful video of the group expressing not only their past experiences, but also their hope for changes in the school system going forward, in addition to sharing their hopes for their own futures. Youth also led a **forum on anti-racism in education**, where the voices of young newcomers and racialized young leaders took center stage, offering invaluable insights into their experiences with individual and systemic racism within the education system in Winnipeg.



For me, and for a lot of people I know, school is our first experience with institutional racism and racism in general. Our experiences on the playground are those moments that make you realize 'oh, I'm Black,' and what that really means. In middle school, you start to realize that you have all the experiences that teach you or tell you what you are and where you belong. And I think all these experiences have led me to think that this is something that I talk a lot about and I want to do something about it, so I plan on becoming a teacher."
